VICTORIA HARVEY IS A BALTIMORE'S CHILD INTERN and a high school senior. As part of our series on teens and partying, we asked her to interview other teenagers about their thoughts on drinking. Most of the students interviewed are seniors or older, and at a point in their lives when underage drinking is more accessible. For all teens interviewed, it is an issue they have considered, whether to drink or not.

It has been a longtime American ritual for teens and young adults to participate in 2017 study of risky youth behavior, found underage drinking. From drinking at parties to "pre-gaming" before football games or school dances, underage drinking is often seen as a rite of passage. But is it a given?

Recently, I had the opportunity to talk with some teenagers in and around Baltimore and the Washington, D.C. suburbs to find out their thoughts on underage alcohol use, and immediately it was apparent that not all of senior. "I'm not sure why, it's just good." today's teens engage in underage drinking. High school senior Elyse, for example, says she chooses not to drink because she doesn't "like the feeling of being drunk." "It messes up your functional system," she says and is simply something that has never interested her.

The Centers for Disease Control, in a that about 30 percent of high school students had consumed alcohol within the survey's previous month, and 14 percent had participated in binge drinking. Teenagers BC spoke with gave a variety of reasons for drinking. Some said it was simply to have a good time.

For now, of course, the legal drinking age is 21. So, where does most of this generation's underage drinking take place? Most said at parties, fraternity houses and college athletic events.

Maria said while she mainly drinks at parties hosted by friends, there are also times where she enjoys the occasional glass of wine or champagne over dinner at home or at family parties, which according to Maria, her parents condone.

Just because underage drinking is illegal does not prevent kids from having access to booze, says senior Harshitha. "Drinking at home while underage may be wrong, but nothing can be done if no one is aware. It's a rule that's placed but not necessarily enforced, unless caught."

Despite their young age, many students say it is possible for them to manage drinking with schoolwork and other activities. "I've seen people at school participate in underage drinking and still manage to get good grades, and maintain a steady after-school activity life," says Aneisa, a high school senior.

Kaylee, another senior, agrees. "I think it is very possible for someone to drink underage and it not affect their school work solely because some people are good at hiding their habits, and as long as the drinking and partying doesn't replace the time used for school work, I think there can be a balance. That doesn't mean I think it's right, but I do think it's possible."

"I believe you can balance it because I consume it, but not heavily enough that it would prevent me from any dayto-day activities," Doyinsola says.

And Ethan says students shouldn't feel the need to "get blackout drunk" every time they drink or use any

type of drug. "Then you have a problem," he says. "Everything in moderation is the key to a healthy mix of fun and business."

But Elyse says drinking "messes with how you think," and that kids still do it because they don't think about that when they are at parties or other events where alcohol is introduced.

Though these comments may come as a shock to some, Irene Khaksari, a guidance counselor at a Howard County high school says, the responses collected here are not shocking or surprising to her in the slightest.

They are "a micro evaluation of the macro issue," she says.

Khaksari says that parents can start a conversation with their teens on this issue by removing "the anxiety" teens often associate with talking about underage drinking.

"Approach it openly, honestly and genuinely" she says. "Punishing them for their open honesty is not going to get the conversation moving."

The teens who do drink see it as a stage of life rather than a major issue, Maria says, adding that the decision to partake in teenage drinking may be more thought out than parents expect. Today's teens care about and consider the facts behind the issue, Maria adds, reiterating the view that as long as drinking is not an everyday occurrence, it's not a problem.

"It's all good as long as you keep the alcohol in the parties and are able to focus on schoolwork when necessary," she says.

NOW WHAT?

So, we have heard from the teens about partying. Now, how can parents get involved in the conversation? Dr. Jack Gladstein, director of the Pediatric Headache Clinic at University of Maryland Medical Center, weighs in.

"Start talking, the earlier, the better," he says. "Be nonjudgmental when your kids tell you stuff, so that conversations can go two ways. You want to be able to let kids know what your value system is, and you want to tell them what you accept and what you don't accept."

Tell your kids what you expect of them, Gladstein adds. Be consistent with this, and stay involved in their lives.

"If kids find themselves in an unsafe place or are not comfortable, they should feel comfortable for you to say, 'I am coming to get you, no questions asked," he says. "They should not feel like they will be judged."

Societal factors are there, and they play a big factor in teenage alcohol consumption.

"When you think about it, almost every commercial is for a beer or some kind of drink," he says. "Kids feel invincible, they want to fit in, and society condones it. It is important that you talk to your kids about what all is out there and to educate them on the risks."

If parents feel that their child's health or future may be at risk due to the consumption of alcohol, Gladstein says they should be on the lookout for these three risk factors: change in mood or behavior; poor school performance; or simply hanging out with "the wrong crowd."

There is one other important factor to consider: the effects of parental drug use in the family. "If a parent struggles

from an alcohol or drug problem, it is important for them to be honest and to open up to their kids about what they are struggling with," Gladstein says.

The bottom line is that the subject of teen partying may be uncomfortable but not one that parents should avoid.

How to Make Spring Cleaning a Family Affair

ee if this sounds familiar: Motivated by your New Year's resolution to declutter, vou binge-watched "Tidving Up with Marie Kondo" on Netflix in January and dutifully thanked a few pieces of outdated clothing and random kitchenware that no longer sparked joy in your life. You may have even inspired your significant other to part with some well-worn socks and your children to say goodbye to a small selection of toys they've outgrown.

Then, sometime between Groundhog's Day and today, your eagerness to "KonMari" your entire home waned as the number of items on your to-do list grew. Now that it's spring, the increase in activities for the family — soccer practice, baseball games, playground playdates - means a decrease in desire to stay indoors and tidy up. Besides, who has the time to clean?

Before you hit the season running, it's important to evaluate what you've accumulated over the winter and decide what to do next. "Spring is a great time to pause," says Rachel Rosenthal, an organizing expert in Bethesda. "Without stopping, your house will become a breeding ground for continued clutter."

Rosenthal recommends that busy parents schedule spring-cleaning sessions as they would doctor or dentist appointments so that they don't get "pushed to the side when weekends get busy." However, you'll want to be realistic with your time to prevent the process from becoming overwhelming. "Start with 30 minute chunks at a time and then give yourself a reward," she suggests.

Before attempting to tackle a decade's worth of clutter in the basement, Rosenthal advises families to begin in spaces that are more manageable. "Starting in the easiest place will give you motivation to continue," she says. The kitchen, bedrooms and bathrooms will be less daunting than, say, the garage.

And when Rosenthal refers to "families," she means the entire family. Involving your children teaches them that tidying up "is how you live, not a just a one-time event" and sends the message that "we are an organized family," she explains.

Katherine Reynolds Lewis, author of "The Good News About Bad Behavior" and a certified parent educator with the Parent

Encouragement Program (PEP), agrees that it's important to include kids in the cleaning process. Participating in chores, Reynolds says, gives them "a sense of themselves as capable and mattering to the family." When children put away their toys, for example, they immediately feel a sense of accomplishment and can see how their effort helps out the family.

After you block off time to organize the kitchen and task the kids with checking the expiration dates on everything in the pantry, you may feel tempted to stock up on bins and baskets. However, Rosenthal recommends completing the decluttering phase of the spring cleaning process before running to Target or The Container Store. Once you're ready to shop, look for products that can help you create organizing systems rather than ones that simply match your home decor. (And remember, always measure your spaces first!)

Although every family's organizational needs will be different, below are a few of Rosenthal's favorite products for creating a tidy home.

- Drawer dividers allow you to neatly separate items by category in bedroom dressers and kitchen drawers.
- Clear shoe boxes make it easy to find what you're looking for and can be stored under the bed, on shelves or in a closet.
- Vertical file folders are ideal for categorizing mail and preventing important paperwork from getting lost in piles.
- Hanging sweater bags create additional vertical space and are a handy way to store board games, hats and gloves, purses and, of course, knitwear.
- Shoe organizers that hang over the door can be used in kids' bedrooms or bathrooms to hold hair accessories and small toys.

Rosenthal understands that decluttering can seem like a chore for those who haven't done it before, so she encourages families to think of it as a way of life instead. "Spring cleaning is just part of the process," she says.

pril 1 may be April Fools' Day, but there's no time for fooling around, as the longawaited fourth quarter of the school year is finally here. Summer is right around the corner. But before you can head to the beach or plan all those backyard barbecues, pay attention to these five tips to end the school year with success.

Sleep on it

Prepare for a shock: The Mayo Clinic's recommended amount of sleep by age group is posted on its website and included here. It's safe to say that most school-age children (and adults) are not getting the recommended amount of sleep. Researchers know that people who don't get quality sleep or enough sleep are more likely to get sick after being exposed to a virus. And if they do get sick, a lack of sleep can also affect how fast they recover. Make sure your children are sticking to a school-year bedtime and not a summer-break schedule.

Take it outside

With springtime temperatures and longer hours of daylight, children should spend some time after school getting exercise and fresh air. Not only will it help them sleep better (and longer) at night, it will improve their concentration for completing homework and studying for tests and quizzes. Keep your eye on the ball

Create a special, end-of-the-school-year calendar. Get out colored markers and a piece of poster board. Mark any important school dates, upcoming field trips, class parties, final exams and graduation ceremonies. Use colorful stickers to count down the days until the last day of school. It's easier to work toward a goal when you have a clear picture in mind, especially with younger children who haven't yet developed a keen sense of time.

The fourth quarter and its mad dash to the end of the school year don't have to be stressful. Using these five tips will help the fourth quarter fly by with good results and a successful end of the school year. ■

When we dive into this eating pattern, it makes sense why it would translate to better health outcomes. Plants - think fruits, veggies, nuts, seeds, beans, legumes - are packed with fiber and nutrients. Most of us don't get enough produce on our plates or fiber in our diets. By making plants the focus of a meal, we are ensuring we get these crucial nutrients. In fact, one American Dietetic Association study using National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey data found that vegetarian diets were higher in fiber, vitamins A, C and E, thiamin, riboflavin, folate, calcium, magnesium and iron with much less environmental damage. compared to non-vegetarian diets.

However, under that definition, there is a full spectrum of plant-based eaters such as vegans, vegetarians, pescatarians and flexitarians. Make Your Child's IEP Meeting a Success:

9 Questions for Parents

ndividualized Education Plan (IEP) When will services be offered? coping with special needs.

"These meetings are very important procedures involved. because the IEP guides how the child will be educated and outlines goals for the child, interventions and any accommodations and services that will be provided," says Dodd White, president and CEO of the Episcopal Center for Children, a D.C.-area non-profit organization providing therapeutic and special education services to children.

"An IEP meeting brings together the entire IEP team assisting your childeducators, treatment providers, parents, the local education agency (LEA) representative and others," White says. "Parents and guardians are an important part of that team. You are there to be an advocate for

It's important for parents and guardians to ask the right questions before, during and after an IEP meeting. Here are some questions to help:

When is the IEP meeting, and how will I participate?

At least 10 days before the IEP meeting, you should receive a letter of invitation. RSVP for the meeting in writing. Inform the school if you will attend the meeting in person or by phone. If you are not available to attend the meeting at the proposed time, suggest alternative dates and times.

What documents will be discussed at the IEP meeting?

At least five business days before the IEP meeting, you should receive draft documents. These may include the IEP, a behavior intervention plan (BIP) or evaluations of your child. Review these documents carefully before the meeting.

Does this plan clearly address my child's education and treatment needs?

Before the meeting, carefully review draft documents and write down your questions and notes. Review the diagnosis and examine the plan carefully to see how it addresses your child's needs.

Is my child progressing toward a goal in the plan?

If your child is not progressing toward a goal as you had hoped, ask how this will be addressed, or if a goal should be revised.

What else can be done to assist my child?

If you think something else might help your child, come prepared to discuss it. Write down any proposed changes to the IEP and any information you would like to add.

Should anyone else attend?

Invite additional people to the IEP meeting if you think they can contribute. An IEP meeting takes a "team" approach to helping your child. Take the initiative to invite individuals who have relevant knowledge or expertise regarding your child.

How can I have a healthy working relationship with the IEP team?

Developing healthy and professional relationships with the school and treatment providers can help your child. Be open to discussing issues promptly, directly, honestly and courteously. Ask questions and listen carefully to answers. This will allow you to respond appropriately and avoid misunderstandings.

How can I support my child at home?

Ask what you can do at home to support and reinforce what your child is learning at school. Realize that home also needs to be a place of respite - a place to recover from the hard work that may have occurred at school.

With a little preparation, you can feel confident in making your child's IEP meeting a great success.



Want a Healthier Family Life?

Consider These Good Habits

re you looking at your temptation to turn weeknight calendar shaking your head, wondering, how did this happen? It's an ongoing challenge, to set boundaries so that the oxygen in our homes isn't sucked dry by the endless stream of obligations, events and invitations creating exhaustion and unhappiness. Perhaps busyness, one of modern-day families' back by resolving to make changes in our approach and practices.

1. Reconsider: Many of these activities are actually optional

Very often, school notices are invitations. As kids grow, parents should incrementally step back to be less present in their academic world. 2. Even during the busiest seasons, sit down and dine together


This alone requires resolve, left for exploration, curiosity but go further and avoid the and creative thinking, the very relationally - and, physically.

dinners into moments of interrogation, putting kids on the defense. Instead, think of this as a quick time of debriefing before they split to get homework done. After all, we want them to willingly show up. Dr. Samantha Boardman, a clinical instructor in psychiatry, describes it well: "Dinner together should come greatest enemies, can be beaten as a welcome break to punctuate your day and not a dreaded chore or additional source of stress." Chilling out around the dinner table, even for 15-minutes, and allowing organic conversation to happen will put your kids at ease and increase the likelihood they'll enjoy time together with you. And that's no small thing.

3. Learn to love our kids' passions and encourage their pursuits

Mine has grown to be a foodie. Food and nutrition interests him so much so that I solicit his input for meal planning. This surprising development, one I couldn't have anticipated, has put us side-by-side in the kitchen, experimenting with new foods and recipes.

In the U.S. News & World Report, Dr. Gail Saltz highlights the dangers of micro-managing the direction your kids take. "Children who are overscheduled tend to feel highly stressed and have no mental energy



In short, we'll need to protect our growing kids from excessive busyness to provide them bandwidth to explore hobbies and interests. They may have our DNA, but the best parenting will allow them space to be who they are, a completely different person, not mini versions of ourselves.

4. Take walks together

On walks, life slows down, giving way to spontaneous conversation. It could be walking the dog together or parking a few blocks from our destination to enjoy the fresh air, blue sky and general public life on the sidewalk. The point is, to step away from our screens and be in the company of our blossoming children no matter if conversation happens or not will always take us forward Kathryn Streeter is a D.C.-based

Prevention Magazine, authors Sari Harrar and Erin Verkler point out the importance of an ordinary walk. They mention the multitude of health benefits including incidental calorie-burning effects and relieving the mind of stress and depression. So don't hesitate: Go on a walk with your family!

This unwieldy thing called time which we see rapidly coming and going, week after week, isn't going to change. But we can. Deciding to establish healthy parameters and fresh rhythms in our homes will help create a more connected family life. It may also provide a memorable picture of health and happiness for our kids to imitate when they are out of the house, managing their own homes. ■
